Facilitate Employment Using Visual Supports - an evidence based practice

As services in California move towards fully inclusive employment opportunities in our communities, service providers are encouraged to use evidence based strategies to support individuals with developmental disabilities in natural ways. Understanding the use of *Visual Supports* opens multiple options to support clients in home and community natural settings. Visual supports include pictures, written words, objects, environmental arrangement, visual boundaries, schedules, maps, labels, organization systems, timelines, and scripts that can be useful in any natural environment. Research based evidence indicates that visual supports are effective with adult clients to improve social, recreational, academic, vocational and

Visual supports can learner independence, support increase transitions between activities, and increase predictability, structure, and clarify expectations of the workplace or the job task. When used correctly, visual supports have been shown to reduce challenging behaviors, reduce reliance on verbal instruction & prompting, and reduce distractions and increase focus on task related activities.
