# **VENDORED ABA and BEHAVIOR MANAGEMENT PROVIDERS**

### Choosing a Quality ABA Provider

**Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA)** is widely recognized as an evidence based practice with strong scientific support for effectiveness with people with autism, intellectual disabilities and related disorders of all ages. For clients of FDLRC, in-home ABA services can be used in comprehensive or focussed interventions to reduce problematic behaviors by teaching communication and adaptive skills. According to the <u>National Autism Center</u>, families should look for providers that:

- involve direct consultation by senior clinicians (doctoral-level or board certified professionals)
- include staff who can clearly describe the design and implementation of an intervention
- integrate research findings with professional judgment and data-based clinical decision making, the values and preferences of families, and capacity to effectively implement interventions
- address the comprehensive needs of individuals on the autism spectrum with sufficient intensity so children and adolescents can make meaningful progress

The <u>Association for Science in Autism Treatment</u> provides guidance<sup>1</sup> on what to ask a prospective ABA provider when seeking a professional intervention for your family member. Key points include:

*Education/credentials of provider*: Quality services in ABA are directed and supervised by a BCBA, a BCBA-D, or a supervised BCaBA. These professionals meet academic standards and follow strict codes of ethics and best practices established by the Behavior Analyst Certification Board (BACB). Verify certification of individual providers at <u>www.BACB.com</u>. Also ask about the education, training, and supervision of front line therapists who will work directly with your family member under supervision by the BCBA or BCBA-D.

*Work Experience of provider*: Look for variety in the professional experience of the provider such as number of years working with clients of different ages, experience in developing assessment and treatments, experience with severe or dangerous problem behaviors, experience in a variety of settings, and how well provider's experience matches your family member's needs. Ask the provider if there are circumstances that could limit their effectiveness in working with your family member.

*Individualization of program*: Ask how your family member's individual needs, circumstances, and future goals will be assessed initially and throughout intervention. The provider should explain how caregivers will be kept informed of their family member's progress and how the interventions will be changed based on data collected in order to improve response to therapy. Ask how program goals will improve the learner's participation in the home, the community, and education/work settings. *Make sure the provider can meet the language and cultural needs of your family.* 

*Caregiver training*: Ask if parents will learn to implement behavior change and adaptive skills interventions in the home and community and when that will start to happen. Ask the provider to explain the importance of observing and measuring goal behaviors (data collection) during family activities, and using techniques in that setting in order to achieve meaningful improvements in behavior and participation.
